

Places to Go

Farmers Market in Pukalani between 6 AM - 11 AM Saturday Mornings

55 Kiopaa St. Makawao

Head to Makawao, and go through the town towards the Haleakala Highway. Go left on Haleakala Highway. Once you hit Kula, take a right before Long's Drugs. Then take an immediate left and you will see the Farmers Market and the parking lot for it.

Hookipa Beach (Surfer Beach)

Great for watching elite surfers from all over the world, along with some turtles and manta rays if you are swimming. Head west on Hana Highway, on the right before Mama's Fish House and Paia. Just look for the sign, the surfers, the waves.

Baldwin Beach

A locals spot, perfect for swimming and snorkeling, or sitting out on a huge sand beach. Also on the North Shore, on the right just after Paia. A cove on the right end for gentle entry. Walk way to the left end for Baby Beach and reef protected swimming area.

Makena Beach State Park (Big Beach)

South Maui's largest beach; south of Wailea open daily from 6am to 6pm. This beach has golden sand stretching 1.5 miles, and as wide as 100 feet in some places. Protected from the trade winds, Makena provides the perfect place for an afternoon snorkel and sunset over the ocean.

Haleakala National Park

Through Makawao, just head back on the Haleakala Highway, go left, and follow the signs to Haleakala, reaching all the way to the summit. This is a leave-at-4AM-trip. If you want to see the most spectacular sunrise (something definitely worth writing about), pack some snacks, grab a coffee on the drive up (at the only coffee stand between here and the summit that is open at 3 AM), bundle up and be ready for some breathtaking, mind-bending, hypnotic viewing of our Mother Earth's rotation and the awakening of our solar system's most magnificent creation. lao Valley

A most spectacular hike; the valley envelopes you like a humble child in awe of the world around. To get there, take a right on East Kuiaha upon leaving the property. Turn left on Hana Highway for 13 miles, and continue on E. Kaahumanu. Turn right onto Kahului Beach Road, right on Waiehu Beach Road, and turn right at the fork, then you will arrive at Iao Valley. Of fascinating, historical significance; read the signs.

Hana Highway

30,000 Haleakala Hwy, Kula

Head to the Hana Highway, take a right (East) and just keep driving. The Road to Hana is known for sites like the Seven Sacred Pools, Twin Falls, The Garden of Eden Arboretum, the Bamboo Forests, Red Sands Beach, the Green Coasts, a ton of waterfalls, and Nahiku Market Place (great stop for a meal). It is perfect for a day trip, but we recommend leaving early because the drive to Hana is two hours each way, or go all around, and have the best driver drive. Some of those turns can be sharp and narrow!

The Maui Arts and Cultural Center (the MACC)

Want to check out some great art, see a theatrical production, a movie, a lecture or catch an annual community dance party? Google to find out what is happening at the MACC when you are in town. This center works as both an art exhibit show room, as well as a concert hall.

Hanzawa's Variety Store

1833 Kaupakalua Rd, Haiku (808) 298-0407

This will be your local convience store and gas station. Just take a left on E. Kuiaha, then a right at the end of the road. The store will be a long block down on your left.

Mama's Fish House

799 Poho Pl. Paia (808) 579-8488

Priciest resturant on our list, but well worth it. This magnificent establishment has been visited by every celebrity to have ever visited Maui and with good reason. Expect the most incredible and unique fish dishes, with sides of poi and Kailua (local kill) pork, and the perfect view of the North Shore. Call ahead for reservations, and call a few days in advance. They are usually completely booked, but happy hour and pupus or lunch at the bar are a great alternative.

Veg Out

Simple, quick, vegetarian, delicious. The staff cares about getting you the healthiest and best tasting food they can. Beware, the vegan pina colada cake is to die for.

Nuka

Local sushi! Tempura Udon! Dynamite roll! Haleakala roll! Ahi salad! Fried ice cream! It just keeps getting better and better. Sushi supreme. Big favorite is the salmon bowl.

Relaxed eatery featuring a Mediterranean & Indian menu. Delicious crepes both sweet and savory...

Hali'imaile General Store

Hali'imaile General Store is Chef Bev Gannon's original and most acclaimed restaurant featuring eclectic American food with Asian overtones. Founded in 1988. The restaurant is open for lunch during weekdays, and nightly from 5 to 9pm.

Mana Foods

Don't feel like eating out and looking for a place to pick up some groceries? Head to this place in Paia. The market has been there since 1983, and we still think it's the best grocery store on Maui. Parking lots to the left or right of the store. Great fresh produce section, salad bar, juices, and yummy delectables. Try the Happy Drink.

Jaws Country Market

Mini Market and lunch stop just up from the famous surf break, Jaws. Hosting local freshly made food, cold drinks, coffees and espressos and Maui-made gifts and merchandise. Known for their open faced veggie toast.

Colleen's

Left off Hana Highway, on the right in the Downtown Haiku Mall. Wonderful for breakfast, great for lunch and something for dinner. American-style resturant with some twists.

La Provence

Beautiful pasteries and meringue. Cheesy, savory quiche (that's really what you're going there for). They're closed on Monday and Tuesday. Wed-Sun they're open from 7 AM - 9 PM. (Get there early to get your hands on some quiche).

Maui Lavendar Cafe

You cannot top the view at this place. Be sure to visit the mountainside lavender gardens, and honestly, everything on the menu is exquisite with lavender in it. Pick your choice.

Cafe Mambo

Funky, vibrant restaurant serving a creative menu of locally sourced burgers, fajitas & salads. Sister restaurant to Cafe des Amis

Choice Health Bar

Marine Mammal & Sea Turtle Viewing "Code of Conduct"

NOAA's National Marine Fisheries Service, NOAA's National Marine Sanctuaries, and the State of Hawaii's Department of Land and Natural Resources. NOAA recommends the following guidelines for viewing whales, dolphins, monk seals and sea turtles in Hawaii:

- -Feeding marine mammals is prohibited by Federal law
- -Remain at least 100 yards from humpback whales, >50 yards from other marine mammals
- -Observe turtles from a distance; do not attempt to touch, ride, or feed turtles
- -Marine mammals and sea turtles should not be encircled; if approached by a marine mammal or turtle while on a boat, put the engine in neutral and allow the animal to pass

A FEW TIPS FOR OUR GUESTS...

With all the crazy times we've all recently gone through, it's more important than ever to be able to communicate with one another! I've heard locals frustrated with tourists and tourists hurt because they're unwanted. A regular, local at the beach I go to every-day suggested everyone write some things they'd be able to offer a tourist and to ask some things from the tourists in the spirit of trying to all "get along". Here's my list:

What I will offer you as a tourist:

- 1. A smile. I'll ask where you're from and join in your excitement at being on our beautiful island.
- 2. I'll give you directions if you ask, or suggestions on where to eat and what to do.
- 3. I'll warn you about waves you may not understand, tell you to stand sideways when a big wave rolls in while you're standing head on. I'll tell you to dive under rather than letting the wave break on you. I'll let you know to never turn your back on the ocean.
- 4. I'll help you fold those Tommy Bahama chairs that no one seems to be able to figure out how to close or I'll help you with your umbrella.
- 5. I'll point out a big sea turtle that's about to swim into you when you're totally unaware, but I can spot them more easily.
- 6. I'll encourage you when it's your last day and you're really devestated that you don't live here that this "time in paradise" is over for you.
- 7. I'll watch and enjoy you having the time of your life, playing like a kid again beacuse you're on the beach and the biggest decision of your day isn't about work but which beach you'll go to today or whether you're going to lay out or swim or build a sand castle.
- 8. I'll remind you to cover up or wear more (reef safe) sunscreen when I can tell you're going to be burnt to a crisp because you don't realize we're close to the equator and we've seen many guests suffer from extreme sunburns.

What I'll ask of you as a tourist where I live:

- 1. Take your time, drive slowly, stop for people in crosswalks. We're not in a hurry here, we have a different pace of life.
- 2. Don't honk. It's considered rude here. Patience is key.
- 3.Be kind to your servers. They take on a lot and are probably underpaid. Most locals have to work several jobs to make ends meet on the island.
- 4. Respect private property. It can be exciting to follow the crowd to see something new but it may not be open to the public.
- 5. Pick up your trash. We have a beautiful island and we have to take care of it.
- 6. Don't stand on the coral. It kills it.
- 7. Don't touch the turtles or bother the Monk Seals.
- 8. Follow the rules, even when they don't make sense. You're a guest on the island. If we have to follow the rules, you do too!
- 9. Be respectful of the people that work and live here. With over 1,000,000 tourists a year, not everyone is on vacation and they may be trying to get to work or get home.
